Normal Festival 2010 — Challenged by Art

Celebrating our fifth anniversary this year on the theme of **Conquering Public Spaces**

For the fifth year the Normal Festival is dedicated to the life stories and artistic work of people who are slow at some things, who have more difficulty getting their bearings in the surrounding world and who probably did not excel in school.

They hit the streets with microphones and cameras capturing events small and large – pre-election political jousting as well as art festivals, organic markets and an alien landing on Letná Plain. They adapt The Little Prince for their first professional theatrical performance. They conduct interviews with ferrymen, residents of the MeetFactory, experts on the cosmos, and prostitutes. They exhibit in your favourite cafés. They work at Inventura and – they have a learning disability. Despite all the sceptics, all year long they've been conquering and continue to conquer public spaces. At the Normal Festival they are your guides to the festival programme, which this year offers the best of the past five years in the world of art by, about and for people with learning disabilities. We are preparing more films than usual for you this year and in addition to cinematographic gems you can also look forward to controversial documentary films from around the world as well as the unconventional per-



spectives of our conquerors of public spaces on such fundamental topics as the origin of the universe. For us, the culmination of the film portion of the festival will be the Prague premier of the documentary film Earthlings, Who Are You Voting For?, which was filmed during the campaign ahead of the 2010 parliamentary elections by students of the Inventura film workshop under the direction of documentary filmmaker Linda Jablonská. The artistic portion of the festival presents Austrian Art Brut master Josef Hofer and Polish artist Justyna Matysiak. Exhibitions of their works can be viewed at the Austrian Cultural Forum and the Polish Institute, respectively, in Prague until the end of the year. Especially in the case of

Josef Hofer you will have a unique opportunity in the Czech Republic to view the work of an artist who has received a number of prestigious awards for his drawings of male nudes unmarked by the well-established procedures and guidelines of art schools. As always, the festival programme will also include theatrical performances, concerts and workshops. The festival's foreign quests this year will include musician William Longden and Theater Maatwerk founder Koert Dekker, who will present the principles of their approach to working with people with learning disabilities using an experiential method. The reverberations of this year's festival will reach distant Bucharest, fraternal Košice, Plzeň, Hradec Králové and Ostrava.

Come join us in conquering public spaces and pushing forward the boundaries of "normal". We look forward to seeing you!

Igor Fidler - I was already nine years old when Prague bid farewell to the good old trolley buses and the Praha Těšnov station. Some people may think that I belong to the older generation. I remember things that young people don't. But in spirit I'm getting younger, as if I was going back.



Josef Fojt - I can still remember my mother telling me that I didn't like breast milk. I don't even know why. I like films, theatre, humour, drawing, music and good people. The first film that really influenced me in childhood was Revolt of the Toys by Mrs. Týrlová. I've made several short films and I collaborated artistically on the film About Sex.



Šárka Hojaková – I was born in Prague. After I was born, the doctors determined that I had a brain defect. Only an operation could help me to live my life, which I enjoy so much. My childhood was problematic but thanks to my mother, with whom I have a great relationship, I was able to overcome all the difficulties.



Lucie Mudročenková – I was born when it was freezing cold, but I prefer summer. I went to photography school for three years. I don't like it when my mother tells me how I should take pictures. I also worked at the Vesmírna café for a couple months.



Robert Novák – My dream is to become a cameraman and also to learn how to take pictures. My father bought me a new digital camera with only a screen but no viewfinder and he taught me to take pictures, but he didn't know he could make my dream come true.

Inventura presents:

Normal Festival 2010 - Conquering Public Spaces

The opening evening of this year's Normal Festival will again offer the traditional amalgam of the most successful audiovisual creations from Inventura and associated foreign organisations. This time, the common theme of all videos presented will be conquering public spaces. Molotov cocktails and cobblestones aside, our weapons are cameras, candid questions, openness and creativity. The Prague Inventura team will present its latest film, this time a documentary, Earthlings, Who Are You

Voting For?, which emerged during the pre-election jousting at political party meetings and in the Inventura film workshop at the MeetFactory. The evening will be accompanied by the improvisational trio of Josef Fojt, Patrik Horvát and Martin Vošmik from Inventura Theatre.

Earthlings, Who Are You Voting For?

(Inventura / 2010 / Czech Republic / 40 min.)



Earthlings, Who Are You Voting For? is a documentary project created by people who have difficulty getting their bearings in the surrounding world and who probably did not excel in school. To be politically correct – they have a learning disability. This does not prevent them, however, from having an original and novel perspective on the world around

them, sensitivity, curiosity and even audacity - all necessary traits of a documentary filmmaker. In Inventura's six-month documentary workshop under the direction of Linda Jablonská, a film emerged which demonstrates that even people with a learning disability can get their bearings in public spaces and have a political opinion. Dokumentality crew followed a phenomenon which affects all of us - elections to the Chamber of Deputies. They participated in pre-election meetings and recorded surveys with citizens as well as politicians on topics which in other media are unusual to say the least. External cameras captured everything that happened in the vicinity - the reactions of security personnel, supporters and opponents of particular political parties. The film crew also investigated whether political correctness and pre-election promises aren't just empty slogans, and attempted to reveal the extent to which - 20 years after the revolution - a prejudice against everything that is not "completely normal" is still rooted in the Czech psyche. The film received the Audience Award at Jihlava International Documentary Film Festival.

Tying Your Own Shoes

(Shira Avni / 2009 / Canada / 16 min.)



"My name is Petra Tolley. I'm 36, and don't worry, I'm fine." Tying Your Own Shoes explores how it feels to be a little bit unusual. Directed by awardwinning filmmaker Shira Avni, this animated documentary provides an intimate glimpse into the exceptional mindsets and emotional lives of four adult artists with Down syndrome. Petra, Matthew,

Katherine and Daninah's artworks are combined with footage from interviews to blur philosophical lines between personal power and "disability". Their first-person narratives challenge widely-believed stereotypes about Down syndrome. Their stories are direct, hard-hitting and wondrous, conveying each artist's individual attitudes to create a touching, four-way essay about ability. The contrast between the glittering world of the celebrities and the colourless, slow-paced existence of social cases forms the scope of Joseph's life and also frames the film.

Refrigerator Mothers

(David E. Simpson / 2003 / USA / 60 min.)



It is America of the 1950s and 1960s, when a woman's most important contribution to society is generally considered to be her ability to raise happy, well-adjusted children. But for the mother whose child is diagnosed with autism, her life's purpose will soon become a twisted nightmare. Looking for help and support, she encounters in-

stead a medical establishment that pins the blame for her child's bizarre behavior on her supposedly frigid and detached mothering. Along with a heartbreaking label for her child, she receives a devastating label of her own. She is a "refrigerator mother". Refrigerator Mothers paints an intimate portrait of an entire generation of mothers, already laden with the challenge of raising profoundly disordered children, who lived for years under the dehumanizing shadow of professionally promoted "mother blame." Once isolated and unheard, these mothers have emerged with strong, resilient voices to share the details of their personal journeys. Through their poignant stories, Refrigerator Mothers puts a human face on what can happen when authority goes unquestioned and humanity is removed from the search for scientific answers.

Drona and Me

(Drona & ik / Catherine van Campen / 2009 / The Netherlands / 19 min.)



Drona is crazy about buses and knows the stops of all the bus lines in Amsterdam by heart. He is of Hindu origin and has autism. We follow him through the eyes of his older brother, Arjun, who says: "When I was eight or nine, I got angry and said to myself: 'What's with him?'". Arjun finds it especially unpleasant when Drona oc-

casionally sticks out his tongue at strangers. In such moments he asks himself what will become of his brother. But Drona has no doubts about his future: one day he will become a bus driver. The film has received a number of awards and nominations at international film festivals.

Body and Soul: Diana and Kathy

(Alice Elliott / 2006 / USA / 40 min.)



Body & Soul: Diana & Kathy is a true story about two life-long friends who have made their home in Springfield, Illinois. Diana drives, cooks, shops, and has been Kathy's personal assistant and friend for the past 35 years. Remarkably, Diana has Down syndrome, a genetic condition that gives her one extra chromosome and a lower

IQ. Kathy on the other hand is 61, has a degree in English, but is nonverbal, and has had cerebral palsy since her birth. As part of their ongoing activist efforts to demystify disability, Diana and Kathy invited Alice into their home over a period of five years to create their film. The documentary is an intimate portrait of two women with disabilities who are determined to live independent, non-institutionalized lives.

Your Child Has Down Syndrome Prenatal Diagnosis: Blessing or Curse?

(Ihr Kind hat Down-Syndrom Pränataldiagnostik: Segen oder Fluch?/Anita Read / 2009 / Germany / 28 min.)

This documentary by German filmmaker Anita Read traces the life of a family into which a child afflicted with Down syndrome is born. After they overcome the initial shock and everything gets on track, there is another pregnancy, this time full of concerns and fears. The doctors know the risks and recommend a prenatal diagnosis. Birte and Matthias are aware that the results could lead to an unsolvable moral conflict about whether every child really has a right to live.

Gefühlsecht und lebensnah – documentary about the German festival Wie wir leben

(Gefühlsecht und lebensnah / Kilian Sterff / 2009 / Germany / 58 min.)

The Wie wir leben (How we live) international festival of short films explores the lives of people with various kinds of disabilities. The documentary summarises the goings-on at the festival, including interesting interviews with filmmakers and jurors, and comments on film trailers.

Reporters for Ear Kiss Magazine - A Colourful World in

Clear Language (Reporter für Ohrenkuss – Eine bunte Welt in klarer Sprache/ Christof Stolle / 2009 / Germany / 28 min.)

Most of what one hears goes in one ear and out the other. Certain words and ideas seem interesting to us, sticking in our heads and becoming a kiss for the ear. In Bonn, Germany, there is a magazine with this name and it is produced by people with Down syndrome. The camera accompanies reporters on a trip to Dresden where they are collect material for a new article, tracing the creative process of people who see the world with different eyes.

Is Love Enough? (Tom Puchniak / 42 min. / 2002 / USA)



In profiles of four families, the film portrays the profound desire of many "retarded" people to raise children and the social and legal barriers they have to overcome to be able to do so. It also reveals the emotional price their children may pay as they get older and outgrow their parents' mental abilities. The film offers an often brutally

frank perspective on the new and growing phenomenon of people who were once institutionalized and sterilized as "feeble minded," but who are now having children of their own. It poses the fundamental question about the rights of parents versus those of their children.

Parents with Limits (Eszter Nordin / 2006 / Hungary / 56 min.)



A young Hungarian couple are expecting their first child, but after the first examination on screen, the doctors make reference to "undervalued contraception". They are concerned that the parents will be unable to raise the child by themselves – they both have learning disabilities and, in addition, the future father is deaf.

The director of this documentary full of unsettling questions follows this family, into which two children are born, for eight years. The first of them, Laci, intrigued her more: he is a very perceptive boy whose scholastic performance seems to be hampered more than anything else by his uninspiring family environment. And for the director it is increasingly difficult to maintain her professional distance.

Monica and David (Alexandra Codina / 2009 / USA / 68 min.)



Monica and David are in love. They also happen to have Down syndrome. Both have strong and long relationships with their respected mothers. Ali Codina's affectionate documentary is an intimate, year-in-the-life portrait of two childlike spirits with adult desires as they prepare for their

fairy tale wedding and face the realities of married life afterward. Taking immense pride in their new roles as husband and wife, David wants to bring home the bacon, and Monica wants to fry it in the pan. They want babies of their own. But their unique circumstances still have them living with Monica's mother and her husband. Their tender kisses and pet names are captured and treasured, but along with their story is one of two different mothers who sacrificed and struggled against an intolerant world to provide for their children.

Before the film, we will screen short videos from Inventura's film workshop under the direction of Linda Jablonská.



Jakub Zachata: They talked about their disabilities. Because I have Down syndrome too, I also see the world variously and graphically. They talked about how they live. That girl was looking forward to the boy. The boy and the girl lived their own life. They took care of their own household.

Joy of Sound - William Longden's workshop



The Joy of Sound is an inclusive musical workshop led by prominent British musician and therapist William Longden, founder of the non-profit organisation of the same name. For the past 10 years, William Longden has been helping disabled people by working with voice, breathing, and playing traditional as well as non-traditional

musical instruments. He is also the inventor of several dozen specially constructed musical instruments enabling certain people to play who would otherwise be unable to do so as a result of their disability. Since 2000, more than 12,000 people with and without disabilities have participated in the inclusive Joy of Sound workshops in several European countries. Workshop participants use various techniques: listening, observation, mirroring, reflecting, searching for soft tones, working with rhythm and voice. Each workshop includes group improvisations which always begin and end in silence.

The Joy of Sound is intended for all those working in an assistive profession and their clients, pedagogues and their students, and last but not least all parents and their children, regardless of age.

At present, Inventura Theater is working on productions which attempt to take maximal advantage of the creativity of individual actors and actresses, and to provide them with the space to express their inspirational view of the world.

To be politically correct – they have a learning disability. This does not prevent them, however, from having an original and novel perspective

on the world around them, sensitivity, curiosity and even audacity - all necessary traits of a documentary filmmaker. In Inventura's six-month documentary workshop under the direction of Linda Jablonská, a film emerged which demonstrates that even people with a learning disability can get their bearings in public spaces and have a political opinion. The Dokumentalit crew followed a phenomenon which affects all of us - elections to the Chamber of Deputies of the Czech Republic. They participated in pre-election meetings and recorded surveys with citizens as well as politicians on topics which in other media are unusual to say the least. External cameras captured everything that happened in the vicinity - the reactions of security personnel, supporters and opponents of particular political parties. The film crew also investigated whether political correctness and pre-election promises aren't just empty slogans, and attempted to reveal the extent to which - 20 years after the revolution - a prejudice against everything that is not "completely normal" is still rooted in the Czech psyche.

Pumpkin

(Adam Larson Broder, Anthony Abrams / 2002 / USA / 113 min.)

A definitive ironic full stop after the Normal Festival. A great B film without which there couldn't be A films. A dark purple vision of the apocalyptic world of American schools. A parody of cheap sentimental films? Let's hope so!

The always perfect Carolyn McDuffy and her sorority sisters have a plan – they want to win an annual charity award by training athletes with learning disabilities and preparing them to participate in a regional sports competition. Carolyn is assigned to Pumpkin Romanoff. At first she is horrified by him but she soon realises that the young man has something inside which she has never experienced in anyone else: tenderness, humanity, sensitivity and an internal purity which have a deep emotional impact on her. To the horror of her friends as well as Pumpkin's mother, who tenaciously protects her son from the world, Carolyn falls in love with Pumpkin.

Look forward to bizarre cosmic cover versions and exo-planetary mash-ups, psychedelic techno and unadulterated noise.

Fig-marigolds will bloom, carrion plants will blossom, syringodeas will swell! Hits generating primitive dance delight? Definitely! But also uncompromising and visionary sounds. Be sure to bring condoms and graphite sticks!


Koert Dekker Workshop

Evening on the topic of Art Brut



Despite the fact that Japanese Kunizo Marsumoto is illiterate, he invented a beautiful and secret writing system. Even though society considers him an outsider, American George Widener is capable of holding in his memory the events of the past 1500 years and of writing even the distant future into his "magic squares" made out

of paper napkins. While Czech Zdeněk Košek has been designated as crazy, he has directed the weather on the entire planet using his graphic diagrams. The feature film Rouge Ciel by French director and Art Brut collector Bruno Decharme is dedicated to geniuses who operate outside the norms. A collage of their portraits, historic excurses and the reflections of theorists, philosophers, psychoanalysts and gallery curators batter our methods of thought and crush well-established views on art and its aesthetic canons.

After the screening there will be a debate with the film authors and two participants: creator Zdeněk Košek and theorist Manuel Anceau.

Art Brut - Josef Hofer 16 November 2010—5 January 2011

Austrian Cultural Forum in Prague, Jungmannovo náměstí 18, Prague 1

Austrian Josef Hofer (born 1945) ranks amongst the most distinctive living artists professing Art Brut.

Hofer – deaf-mute, uneducable and suffering from a learning disability – was cast into social isolation in early childhood. But in return, this not only brought him independence from both social and artistic conventions, but also absolute creative freedom. He chose drawing as his main means of communication. Hofer draws in an unrestrained manner, spontaneously, moving beyond any inner or outer censorship. The authenticity, originality and artistic qualities of his oeuvre make him one of the pre-eminent masters of Art Brut.

Essential to Josef Hofer was his discovery of the human figure or, rather, the reflection of his own nudity in the mirror. The image of his sexually aroused body came to fascinate him. Hofer is magically and irresistibly drawn to that image in the same way as Narcissus was mesmerised by the reflection of his own face on the water's surface in the well. But while Narcissus' self-centred love, which could never be fulfilled, brought him nothing but suffering and death, Josef Hofer's awakening to his own corporeality and the introduction to his alter ego represented a kind of rebirth. Hofer retains in his memory the erotic moments, experienced in the company of his mirror alter ego, until the

next day in order to transfer them onto paper and insert them into a precisely outlined frame in the studio of a daytime social welfare institution in the Austrian city of Ried, near Linz. And while he can sketch his figures on paper in a few minutes, he needs hours to frame them. A certain kind of a scaffolding of lines helps him build structures which lock his figures into either confined or protective cages. The posture and gestures of the figures then tell us whether the personality in question is suppressed or triumphant. The way in which Hofer features these individuals is as astonishing as his perspective construction of space and flawless composition. He has managed to arrive spontaneously at the shortcut which many modern artists have strived for perennially. Hofer's expression is so powerful that it tears down all barriers between the professional and the amateur, as it does between the peuvres of "the normal" and "the disabled"

The first Prague exhibition of Josef Hofer is the result of collaboration among the Austrian Cultural Forum, the civic association Inventura and the civic association abcd.

Art Brut - Justyna Matysiak

The oeuvre of Polish artist Justyna Matysiak (31) has received numerous awards for its exceptional qualities. Among other things, the mentally disabled artist won the competition section of the international 2007 INSITA exhibition, i.e. the Triennial of Untrained Art, held in Bratislava. Her solo exhibition was organised within the

framework of the same event this year.

Justyna Matysiak was born in 1979 in the Polish city of Poznań. She currently lives with her family in the Polish countryside. The ensuing lifestyle is also significantly reflected in her work – she loves to draw animals, but also human figures and architecture. Her drawings are fragile, almost disembodied, and they usually display a monochrome palette. They testify to the artist's extraordinary aesthetic maturity which remains in a raw state – for it has never been moulded by any art education. Justyna Matysiak simply ranks amongst the most noteworthy phenomena in the field of contemporary Art Brut.
